Instructions:

To qualify for a full score, Open, Open Youth, 4-H and FFA must have the following:

Separate judging, display area and signed accordingly, listed in the premium book and have the required number of exhibitors and exhibits.

- All sections must have at least three exhibitors.
- Mules, draft horses, miniature ponies, etc., may be substituted for Horses, or be considered a Special Exhibit.

4-H, FFA, Youth and Open Class:

Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Horses, Goats and Llama:

Must have 10 head and 3 exhibitors to be considered for maximum score (sow/litter, one exhibit).

- One to four head – up to 10 points maximum
- Five to nine head – up to one-half score listed
- Ten head or more – up to full score

Poultry, Rabbits, Dogs, Cats, and all Still Life:

Must have 20 exhibits and 3 exhibitors to be considered for maximum score.

- One to nine – up to 5 points maximum
- Ten to nineteen – up to one-half score listed
- Twenty or more – up to full score

Other Instructions:

- Maximum of one half score for competitive exhibits not seen.
- Exhibits must be on grounds for at least 7 hours for evaluation.
- Contracted exhibits not to be counted but considered as a special display.
- When fair is open to the public, and advertised as such, all exhibit buildings should be open and ready.
